News from the Field

Arkansas: FLN partners from The Nature Conservancy and Arkansas Forestry and Game and Fish agencies were among the 40 people who took part in a recent **prescribed fire school** at Camp Robinson hosted by the Arkansas Prescribed Fire Council. Two news crews filmed parts of the event for three stations; the <u>story</u> by KATV is particularly good, with the anchor starting by asking why prescribed fire is so important, and closing by answering that it is returning the forests "to the way nature intended."

California: In a <u>blog</u> titled "Fighting Fire with Fire," Sustainable Northwest has profiled **Michelle Medley-Daniel** (<u>wrtc@hayfork.net</u>) of the **Watershed Research & Training Center** as "the **next generation**" leading Trinity County (CA) in its **adaptation to climate change**. In truth, because of her key roles in the **CKS FLN** and the new **Fire Adapted Communities Learning Network**, Michelle's influence is far more than county-wide.

New Mexico: The international prescribed fire training exchange that wrapped up last week included training in media outreach, and as with previous events, reached a wide audience with its fire and restoration messages. The <u>first story</u> ran on Fronteras: The Changing America Desk, a multimedia collaboration among seven public radio stations. From central Texas to southern California, and Las Vegas to the Mexican border, Fronteras reaches about a million listeners.

In addition, **Telemundo New Mexico** covered a controlled burn in a Spanish-language <u>video</u> posted on their Facebook feed, a **KRQE News 13** crew made the two-hour trip to share the <u>story</u> with their audience, and **Jeremy Bailey** (jeremy_bailey@tnc.org) was interviewed by Santa Fe **radio station KSFR** for a noon newscast.

An *FLN Notes from the Field* covering the first week of the training exchange is also attached. The **second prescribed fire training event** of the fall is currently underway near Angel Fire, New Mexico.

New Mexico: Anne Bradley (<u>abradley@tnc.org</u>) was quoted (and pictured) in a <u>story</u> in the Santa Fe New Mexican last week. Along with a specially-trained dog from Conservation Canines, she was in the field tracking **endangered Jemez Mountains salamanders**, which are threatened by a combination of uncharacteristic wildfire and drought.

Oregon: **Pete Caligiuri** (<u>pcaligiuri@tnc.org</u>), **Russ Hoeflich** and **Chris Topik** are among those quoted in a **three-part series of articles** in the *Bend Bulletin*: <u>Part 1</u>: "Decades of human intervention have **reshaped the timber landscape**," <u>Part 2</u>: "Growing fires consume **forest management budgets** and threaten life and property," and <u>Part 3</u>: "**Collaboratives** bring stakeholders together to find a **solution** for east-side forests."

Virginia: The third season of the Warm Springs Mountain Restoration Project **Avian Monitoring Program** has been completed, and a <u>brief report</u> is now available. In this landscape, **FLN partners** have conducted almost **6,000 acres of controlled burns**, and another 880 acres burned in a managed wildfire. The monitoring has revealed **increased species diversity in burned areas**. Funding Opportunities: JFSP

JFSP: The Joint Fire Science Program has announced its **2014 research funding** opportunities. All pre-proposals are due by **November 22**. See the <u>announcements</u> for complete details on all programs.

- Areas of interest for the **primary funding opportunity** include **fuels treatment effectiveness** across landscapes; **influence of past wildfires** on wildfire behaviour, effects and management; and compatibility of fire and fuel treatments with **bats**, among others.
- The two areas of interest in the social sciences are fire adapted communities and risk perception.
- There is also a **Graduate Research Innovation Award** opportunity for graduate students in the fields of wildland fire and related human dimensions and ecological sciences.

Resources: Forest Restoration Guide / New Rx Council

Forest Restoration Guide: Restoration of Dry Forests in Eastern Oregon: A Field Guide has been published with support from the Northwest FLN and several other partners. This thorough and practical 200-page guide covers principles of restoring dry forests, landscape planning and stand prescriptions for restoration, field implementation, and other considerations. New Rx Council: A prescribed fire council is getting started in Oregon. According to the chair, Amanda Stamper, "this process began last December at the Association for Fire Ecology International Congress in response to presentations by Leyna Quinn-Davdison and Morgan Varner on prescribed fire councils," and over 100 people are now becoming involved. Articles: Sudden Oak Death Surprise / Adaptive Management

Sudden Oak Death Surprise: Kerry Frangioso (<u>kfrangioso@ucdavis.edu</u>), a core team member in the FireScape Monterey FLN landscape, is a co-author of the article, "Unexpected Redwood Mortality from Synergies between Wildfire and an Emerging Infectious Disease," published in Ecology (<u>abstract</u>). Stories about the findings of this work also appear on the National Science Foundation <u>website</u> and in the September <u>newsletter</u> of the California Oak Mortality Task Force.

Adaptive Management: The <u>new issue</u> of *Ecology and Society* has a number of pieces related to adaptive management. These include, for example, an <u>essay</u> by Lynn Scarlett, "**Collaborative Adaptive Management**: Challenges and Opportunities," and the <u>article</u>, "**Results Chains**: A Tool for Conservation Action Design, Management, and Evaluation."

Link: Trail Rehabilitation

Trail Rehabilitation: Don Amador (damador@cwo.com), a long-time recreation use advocate and partner in the new **Mendocino FireScape** landscape, has written a <u>blog</u> on **volunteer work parties** organized to assist agency personnel in **vehicle trail rehabilitation** in the wake of wildfire. Markers identifying trail entrances and vehicle restrictions are often destroyed by fire or heavy equipment, so new trail delineators are needed. He "believes that volunteers will continue to play an important role in those trail projects. It is a team effort to repair post-fire damage and will require **continued partnerships** with users, agency staff... and other stakeholders."

In the News: New York Times / WUI Fee Proposed

New York Times: A long and wide-ranging <u>article</u>, "Into the Wildfire," in the *New York Times* magazine covers some of the **science challenges** of managing fire (for example, the surprising finding that fine fuels do not ignite from radiative heating) also addresses the thornier **socio-political issues**.

WUI Fee Proposed: A task force in Colorado has presented its recommendations to the governor, according to a <u>story</u> by a Denver TV station. Among them are assigning risk scores to homes in the wildland-urban interface, assessing fees on properties at high risk, and an improved prescribed burn program.

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Fire Learning Network Notes from the Field

Prescribed Fire Training Exchange: Week 1 Wrap-up

Wrap-upSeptember 2013Santa Fe National Forest, New Mexico

"It's a real treat to be here when everything is green and lush, and the clouds are low. A real treat."

With those words, Jeremy Bailey and the 27 exchange participants headed out on the first of several 6:00 a.m. hikes. The overnight rain had just ended. Everyone was "fire-ready," tools in hand and headlamps affixed to their helmets.

During the first week of the training exchange, morning hikes have helped participants acclimate to the elevation. Lectures and field exercises have covered ignition techniques, shelter deployment, first aid, fire line construction, radio use and weather. Local fire experts have dropped by in the evenings to share their perspectives, and there have been day-long field trips to visit wildfire burned areas as well as areas treated with thinning and burning. Participants have also

given detailed presentations about fire management issues from the countries where they work, and woven through it all have been lively discussions on a variety of topics.

On Friday, before a visit to scout the Mesa Camino burn unit in the Covote Ranger District of the Santa Fe National Forest, the district ranger addressed the group. highlighting the importance of the partnership with these training exchanges. He also discussed the need for a more vibrant wood products industry in the area. The group proceeded to Mesa Camino, which is in a remote part of the state, east of the town of Cuba. and more than two hours from Santa Fe by car, and in spite of a week that started with local flashflooding, were able to put a little smoke in the air. Learning from this exercise was captured during the evening's after action review.

Sunny weather over the weekend continued to dry out burn units, so the crews prepared to spend the second week of the exchange burning on Borrego Mesa, just north of New Mexico's capital, Santa Fe.
