News from the Field

National: The narrative part of our semi-annual report for the first half of 2015 is now available on the Conservation Gateway. It includes the executive summary, a PERFACT overview, and sections on the FLN, FAC Net and TREX, as well as a graphic on the evolution of TREX and the final report for SPER II. California: The July Western Klamath Restoration Partnership workshop focused on collaboratively developing prescription options for fuels treatments in both overgrown pine plantations and natural forest stands. The group first looked at the mountainside in question and discussed the overall strategy of using roadside and ridgetop treatments to enable landscape-scale fires to burn in the future. The next day, participants worked in small groups to complete a tree marking exercise along a roadway, flagging trees to leave or remove. Assisting the group was fire researcher Carl Skinner, who remarked, "It was amazing how much agreement there was among the different groups about what they wanted the forest to look like, but how much variety there was in their ideas about how to get there." He noted that diversity in treatments is valuable especially when uncertainties like the impacts of drought and climate change are involved. California: With the fire season getting lively, the <u>Salmon River & Orleans Complexities group</u> on Facebook is also active again. The group has almost 1,600 members, and has become a community space for questions and information about wildfires around the Klamath and Trinity Rivers.

The local FLN/FAC Net fire report, from **Michelle Medley-Daniel**: "The <u>Fork Complex</u> includes all of the **fires right around Hayfork**. The <u>South Complex</u> includes the fires around Hyampom (where we've done some of our **SPER work**). There are also fires to the southwest around Ruth Lake (in southern Trinity) and to the northwest around Denny (between us and the **Mid-Klamath folks**). And that's just in our general vicinity! Certainly unprecedented. We are learning a lot, of course, and the timing of our CWPP update—slated for this fall—will hopefully be a good way to capture that learning and the interest of citizens."

South of that, the **Rocky Fire** has jumped Highway 20 and is burning in the **FireScape Mendocino** landscape. CAL FIRE has <u>incident information</u> for this fire.

North Carolina: According to a Forest Service <u>update</u>, the **Bald Knob Fire** (**Pisgah NF**) is "**moving naturally across the terrain** in an area where damage from southern pine beetle created high levels of fuels. This area is **adjacent to multiple prescribed burn areas** that have recently been treated as part of the **Grandfather Restoration Project** which will limit the fire's ability to spread rapidly." A module experienced in managing fires for multiple objectives is implementing a **confine and contain strategy** on the fire.

North Carolina: In September there will be a new interpretive trail in the Pisgah NF. FLN partners—TNC, USDA Forest Service and the Consortium for Appalachian Fire Managers and Scientists—are developing materials that will focus on the role and history of fire on the landscape, the basics of

ecological succession, and restoration efforts in the region. These will include wayside signs, large kiosks and an audio tour (available on CD and downloadable podcast). Jenifer Bunty (jenifer.bunty@tnc.org) and Adam Warwick (awarwick@tnc.org) are using #goodfire to launch a campaign announcing the trail and encouraging discussion of the role of fire in this area.

Oregon: As part of the Wildland Fire Leadership Council (WFLC) meeting held in Ashland last week, partners in the Ashland Forest Resiliency project hosted a field tour of the city's municipal watershed. According to an article in the Ashland Daily Tidings, Kris Sarri of the Department of Interior found "a very impressive level of community engagement among stakeholders" in the Ashland work. In addition to the local FLN and FAC Net efforts highlighted in the tour, afternoon panel sessions featured the work of regional Washington and California FAC networks. A poster session hosted by the FLN and FAC Net also displayed the posters from the networks' June workshop, and drew about 75 people.

In the course of this <u>meeting</u>, WFLC members discussed **areas of focus for the next 18 months**. These include promoting **cross-boundary collaboratives**; working on **smoke and air quality** issues; addressing **environmental compliance** issues; **engaging communities** in Cohesive Strategy behaviors; and developing and implementing a **robust communications strategy** to support the identified objectives.

Oregon: In Bend, there was some nice coverage of a public tour to the site of a major fire 25 years ago and a minor one more recently that highlighted the value of treatments. FAC Net members Alison Green and Ed Keith were quoted in a newspaper article ("Shevlin Fire Field Trip Offers Lessons: People Who Live near where Fire Burned Learn Why It Stayed Small"). But perhaps a local resident said it best: "Avoiding a wildfire that destroys homes takes a combination of thinning like the projects highlighted during the walk and people keeping brush from becoming overgrown on their own property." A brief story about this **Project Wildfire** tour also ran on the local KTVZ.

Washington: **Leavenworth** was one of the communities highlighted in the "success stories" section of the <u>report</u> on this year's **National Wildfire Community Preparedness Day** on the **National Fire Protection Association** website. The <u>write-up</u> mentions the "go kit" project and other activities led there by the **Chumstick Wildfire Stewardship Coalition**.

Resources: Property Assessment Quick Guides / WUI Map & Data / Media Toolbox / Climate Tools

Property Assessment Quick Guides: The **FAC Net** has published its <u>second set of quick guides</u> based on the **learning of the network** and its members. This set focuses on using property assessments to promote fire adapted communities. The three **two-page guides** include an **overview** as well as guides covering **data and tools** and **training**, each with links to more resources.

WUI Map & Data: The Forest Service <u>publication</u> The 2010 Wildland-Urban Interface of the Conterminous United States and its maps, statistics and underlying data are now available. WUI makes up 9.9% of the area and includes about a third of the houses in the conterminous states.

Media Toolbox: Resource Media has a set of **communication tools for nonprofits** that seem to cover just about everything from building a message to making good infographics to using social media and search engine optimization.

Climate Tools: The USDA Climate Hubs site has a new <u>Climate Hubs Tool Shed</u> with links to a variety of resources "for the climate, agriculture and forestry sectors. The tools range from **specialized** calculators to maps, models and datasets estimating a variety of outputs (e.g., crop production, greenhouse gas flux, and species distribution)."

Compositional and Structural Changes over Time with Different Fire Regimes in Linville Gorge, NC

In this **Southern Blue Ridge FLN** webinar, **Cassandra Pallai** will discuss research conducted in Linville Gorge based on resampling plots originally put in during 1992 for her Master's project at Duke University. The plots have been resampled (by Waldrop and others) periodically and give a nice sampling of different fire regimes in Linville. Plots within the Table Rock Fire footprint were recently sampled, and Pallai combined those results with the original sampling and Waldrop's resampling to study compositional and structural changes over time with different fire regimes.
