News from the Field

California: The **Northern California Prescribed Fire Council** held its **annual workshop** last week in Lake County, location of the deadly, devastating **Valley Fire** that burned last summer under extremely hot, dry and windy conditions. Workshop participants **visited the burned area**, and were able to discuss the first desperate day of the fire with local firefighters and residents who were caught in the fire fight. Participants also visited **treatment areas** that made a difference—and others that didn't. The Council is working with the state legislature and agencies to help inform legislation that will **increase the ease and success of prescribed fire** treatments in the future. Georgia: The latest Georgia Wild<u>newsletter</u>, published by the Georgia Department of Natural Resources, has a story about using controlled burns at Tallulah Gorge. The story closes with a call to action—nice touch—with suggestions that include places to learn more about prescribed fire and ways to donate to support the agency's efforts. Nebraska: The Loup River TREX wrapped up over the weekend, after two weeks of burning, training and outreach opportunities. The 25 participants completed 2,464 acres of prescribed burning, in spite of the typical Nebraska spring weather—blizzards and extremely windy conditions, rain and Red Flag warnings ... as well as some picture-perfect conditions for getting a lot of work accomplished. Media coverage included a radio interview with Ben Wheeler (ben.wheeler@nebraska.gov) before the event (which gave people information about burning, and contact information if they had questions). The article "Valley County Landowners Benefit From Controlled Fires" appeared during the TREX, written by a reporter who took part in the media day.

New Jersey: A <u>story</u> about the February **Ready**, **Set**, **Go!** train-the-trainer workshop in Ocean County is on the RSG website. **FAC Net** members **John Cowie** and **Bill Brash** (<u>forester82@aol.com</u>) were among the hosts of the event, which drew 75 members of 35 local fire departments.

Oregon: The FLN is among the partners that contributed to an <u>updated Map Guide for Ashland</u> <u>Visitors</u>. This **new map guide** better highlights the **connection between watershed health and quality of life** for the city, the region, and its visitors. Text has also been updated for the **history of frequent fire** in the watershed and habitat for wildlife sections and there is new coverage of the **Ashland Forest Resiliency Project**, and its work to improve conditions through **collaboration** in stewardship and monitoring. Virginia: The George Washington National Forest Stakeholder Collaborative—which includes many partners from the Central Appalachians FLN—was recently awarded the Forest Service's 2015 Partners and Community Engagement award for their efforts on the George Washington National Forest Land and Resource Management Plan (Plan) and Lower Cowpasture Restoration and Management Project. Washington: Meeting together after the most expensive and devastating fire season in the state's recent history, the Washington Prescribed Fire Council brought together nearly 50 people from private, state and public agencies to discuss legislation opportunities, resource sharing and outreach efforts that will help scale up the use and impact of prescribed fires on lands across Washington. The conference agenda is posted on the Council's website, and a summary will be available there soon.

National: We've completed the <u>final report</u> for Promoting Ecosystem Resiliency through Collaboration (PERC), the cooperative agreement that supported the FLN, FAC Net, TREX and SPER from 2011 through 2015. It gives a brief overview of the remarkable growth and development of those strategies over that five-year period, along with a few illustrative examples (apologies, for the 99.9 percent of the accomplishments, large and small, that for reasons of space weren't specifically mentioned). Most of all, many thanks to the hundreds of people across the country, and throughout the agencies, organizations and communities involved, who contributed to this body of work—and continue to do so.

Input Request: Communication Stories

Communication Stories: At its regional conference in November, the **Southwest Fire Science Consortium** will be hosting a roundtable on **solutions to communications issues** that arise during wildfires and adversely affect decision-making. They ask, "Have you worked on fires where communication issues led to less than desirable outcomes in terms of potential benefit to the land?" Social Media: Everyone's using it. And by now, everyone's expecting you to use it, too. So to help make the most of these tools, the FAC Net had outreach expert Leigh Greenwood give a couple of short presentations on their most recent webinar. The recordings are now available on the FAC Net YouTube channel. The first recording, "State of Social Media," gives a quick update on the various available platforms and some thoughts about how to choose among them to meet your needs. The second recording, "Social Media and Behavior Change," covers some steps that will help clarify the results you want from your outreach messaging—the changes you want to inspire—and how social media can help you get there.

FAC Newsletter: The FAC Learning Network has started a monthly e-mail newsletter, The Net Weaver. While there may be some overlap in content with the FLN Networker, the new publication focuses more on the community side of fire management. Subscribe at http://fireadaptednetwork.org/subscribe/. Fire Message Themes: NIFC has posted the <u>2016 National Fire Season Themes</u> to the public information officer (PIO) <u>bulletin board</u>. In addition to **safety** messages, there are some that tie well to network actions, including statements such as "Projects that reduce vegetation **across land management boundaries** help create more **resilient ecosystems**," and "Taking **individual responsibility** to reduce flammable materials **around homes and communities** before a fire occurs can **help keep the public and firefighters safe**." **Field Weather App**: The **University of Montana** has released a smart phone app (with versions for both <u>iPhone</u> and <u>Android</u>) for recording field weather observations. It **calculates relative humidity** (RH) from wet and dry bulb readings, **probability of ignition** (PIG), and **fine dead fuel moisture** (FDFM) estimates; captures **location** with phone GPS; and allows you to take a **photo** and store it with the weather observation data. Results can be shared via email, including data files for spreadsheets and Google Earth.

FireWise of Southwest Colorado (<u>www.southwestcoloradofires.org</u>) is a regional non-profit organization that promotes wildfire education and preparedness, planning, and hazardous fuels mitigation across Archuleta, Dolores, La Plata, Montezuma, and San Juan Counties.

FireWise represents and partners with a wide range of agencies and organizations including, but not limited to, the Colorado State Forest Service, Colorado Division of Fire Prevention and Control, County Sheriffs and Emergency Managers, fire departments, the US Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, National Park Service, tribal entities, The Fire Adapted Communities Learning Network, other non-profit organizations, and community leaders with a vested interest in wildfire preparedness, prevention and education.

About the Position

FireWise promotes wildfire education in an effort to broaden understanding of the inherent wildfire risk to communities and residents living in the wildland-urban interface. Our programs are designed to help empower residents to take actions that can help reduce or mitigate that risk. In 2004, FireWise began an innovative program known as the Neighborhood Ambassador Program, which recruits volunteers to mobilize their neighborhoods and communities to increase their wildfire preparedness and fire adaptedness. The FireWise Chapter Coordinator serves as the central contact person for Ambassadors within their county(s) and their main role is to connect with Ambassadors and enhance the Ambassador program in all ways possible through careful volunteer and program management. In this role, the Coordinator connects volunteers to resources, listens, problem solves, promotes successes, recognizes and solves conflicts, and ensures Ambassadors are fulfilling the majority of their commitments. The Chapter Coordinator serves as the "hub" of the program connecting with Ambassadors through phone calls, e-mails, and field visits. The Coordinator may also manage detailed projects, initiatives and tasks (described below under Planning and Fuels Mitigation Projects).

The Chapter Coordinator serves a regional liaison between federal, state, county, and local representatives to encourage information exchange and strengthen collaborative partnerships between agencies and communities.

JOB DUTIES

Duties include, but are not limited to, the bulleted items listed below each program area.

<u>Ambassador Program</u>

- Coordinates all aspects of the Ambassador Program in La Plata County using broad program direction provided by the Executive Director and the Fire Council Steering Committee.
- Manages volunteer Ambassadors including recruitment, orientation, recognition, and striving to ensure Ambassadors are fulfilling most of their agreed-upon commitments.
- Stays current on new information to distribute to Ambassadors; assembles volunteer notebooks and keeps information current.
- Resolves program issues that arise.
- Assists with planning of bi-monthly Fire Council meeting.
- Provides input to Annual Report and news bites for monthly "FireWise E-News."
- Ensures regular media coverage for the program.
- Works with Ambassadors and community partners to promote and organize activities/events for National Community Wildfire Preparedness Day in May.

Education and Outreach

FireWise provides general community outreach to grow our Ambassador program and promote resources and wildfire preparedness and Fire Adapted Communities messaging to the general public.

- Understand and effectively speak to wildfire-related issues to deliver consistent and site-specific messaging about wildfire risk and mitigation actions.
- Assist with the development of educational material and presentations.
- Attend, coordinate, and help facilitate community, homeowner association, and other related meeting
 opportunities to deliver presentations and educational materials, promote FireWise programs, and
 strengthen community-based relationships.
- Coordinate and complete targeted outreach to communities and individuals.
- Partner with our wildfire research team to provide necessary information, critical data collection and detailed community outreach for ongoing wildfire risk research.
- Understand and promote national programs such as Fire Adapted Communities, Firewise Communities/USA, and Ready, Set, Go! within communities.
- Assists with developing and keeping information current on the Southwest Colorado FireWise Web site.

Wildfire Planning

FireWise develops planning products to help homeowners, communities and partners understand wildfire risk and prioritize future risk reduction activities.

- Work with communities to encourage the development of parcel-level wildfire risk assessments, community assessments and/or community-level Community Wildfire Protection Plans (CWPPs).
- Facilitate and complete fieldwork associated with wildfire risk assessments and community assessments in order to develop associated planning documents.

Fuels Reduction and Mitigation Projects

FireWise offers a variety of cost-share incentive programs to assist landowners and homeowners with implementing defensible space, individual and community chipping efforts, and landscape-scale fuels reduction activities.

- Promote FireWise incentives programs.
- Facilitate the implementation of fuels-reduction projects recommended in community assessments and County and community-level CWPPs.

- Coordinate and conduct homeowner site assessments in collaboration with the Colorado State Forest Service and other involved partners.
- Support reporting efforts by tracking detailed programmatic information.
- Participate in pre-project fieldwork.
- Coordinate with land management agencies to plan for and implement strategic cross-boundary fuelsreduction treatments.

Organizational Goals and Sustainability

FireWise actively plans for the sustainability of our organization and programs. The Coordinator will support the FireWise Director's efforts to ensure timely progress toward future organizational direction and vision. *Potential Tasks:*

- Participates in FireWise Council Steering Committee.
- Assists with executing Program Sponsorship program.
- Pursue funding opportunities in collaboration with other FireWise contract staff and partners.
- Assist with writing grants for the program(s), and carrying out necessary grant monitoring and reporting.

- Understanding of your communities' unique characteristics, and willingness to work with each at the grassroots level.

- College degree in a related field, or 2 years of experience in wildfire education and mitigation or natural resource management is preferred
- Volunteer management
- Program management and oversight
- Proven coalition building around a community issue(s)
- Proven experience at working with many different agencies and partners around a public issue
- Event planning
- Grant writing and fundraising experience
- Public speaking
- Media experience

Compensation:

This is a contract position paid on an hourly basis. **Hours:** Guaranteed 80 hrs/mo, with potential for 10-30 hrs/mo of special project management, plus mileage. Starting pay range from \$20.00 - \$25.00/hour depending on qualifications and experience of the successful candidate.

The Coordinator must have the ability to work from a home office. This position will be under contract to the San Juan Mountains Association (SJMA), our 501c3 fiscal agent; however, the position will report to the Executive Director for FireWise of Southwest Colorado.

Graduate Research Assistantship (M.S.) in Forestry at Northern Arizona University

An M.S. graduate assistantship is available in the School of Forestry, Northern Arizona University (NAU), Flagstaff, AZ. The research is focused on fire ecology, forest management, climate change, and culturally important ecosystem services (production of teepee poles) on Native American lands of the Mescalero Apache Tribe in New Mexico.

Douglas-fir trees capable of producing teepee poles are a culturally important resource for the Mescalero Apache Tribe and are officially listed as a tribal species of concern. Teepee poles come from small diameter (2-5 inch) Douglas-fir trees that are 15-40 feet tall depending on the size of the teepee to be erected. Persistence and development of Douglas-fir teepee poles in a changing climate is a major concern of the tribe. This project is aimed at inventory and modeling of small-diameter Douglas-fir trees within the forested landscape of the Mescalero Apache tribal lands. The effect of climate change on forest resources is poorly understood but there are new tools such as the Climate-Forest Vegetation Simulator model that provide practical ways to consider climate change impact.

The project is part of an ongoing collaboration between Northern Arizona University, the Mescalero Apache Tribe, and the Bureau of Indian Affairs. Principal investigators at NAU are Dr. Peter Fulé, Dr. Yeon-Su Kim, and Dr. Andrew Sánchez-Meador. The graduate assistantship includes an academic-year stipend, summer field season wages, tuition waiver and student health insurance.
