News from the Field

Arkansas, New Mexico, Virginia: Congratulations to network members involved in three of the new projects that have been awarded Joint Chiefs' Landscape Restoration Partnership funding: "Building Resilient Watersheds to Improve Drinking Water in the Ozark & Ouachita Highlands" (Arkansas), "Greater Santa Fe Fireshed" (New Mexico) and "North Shenandoah Mountain Restoration Project" (Virginia). New Mexico: The **Rio Grande Water Fund** is the focus of the Associated Press <u>article</u> "Report: Work to Reduce Wildfire Risks Has Economic Benefits," which recently ran in numerous papers. LANDFIRE: The deadline to submit **polygon data on disturbance and treatment** activities from 2019 (along with any from 2017 and 2018 that hasn't already been submitted) to LANDFIRE is **March 31**. For details, see the data call letter and reference data webpage.

Resources: Certified Burners / Panic Myth / Public Engagement / Traditional Knowledge

Certified Burners: Hot off the presses is report "Insights and Suggestions for Certified Prescribed Burn Manager Programs" from the Forest Stewards Guild. The Washington State legislature charged the Department of Natural Resources to develop a certified prescribed burn manager program. The DNR, Washington RC&D Council and Washington Dry Forests FLN contracted the Forest Stewards Guild to compile information about existing programs and provide guidance for Washington's program. Findings and recommendations in this report are broadly applicable to other states considering new certified burner programs or revising existing programs.

Panic Myth: The FAC Net <u>blog post</u> "The Panic Myth: What Does the Research Say and What Can Practitioners Do?" tackles the myth that "the public will panic" in the face of information about an

emergency. Social scientist **Sarah McCaffrey** introduces the **research** on the topic and, wearing her public information officer hat, **Annie Schmidt** lays out some **practical advice** for practitioners.

Public Engagement: The general technical report "Protocol for Social Vulnerability Assessment to Support National Forest Planning and Management: A Technical Manual for Engaging the Public to Understand Ecosystem Service Tradeoffs and Drivers of Change" provides detailed instructions for an exercise to elicit and analyze public input. (Note that for this work, vulnerability is defined broadly, as "the potential influence on human well-being that results from a change in the provision of an ecosystem service.")

Traditional Knowledge: The first issue of a **new newsletter**, "Traditional Knowledge and Fire," will be available soon. This bi-annual newsletter will provide an avenue for those interested in TK and fire in the **northern Rockies and Pacific Northwest** to find and share upcoming news, events, management tools and applications, research and more. Articles & Reports: PODs / Barriers & Opportunities / Post-Fire Regeneration / Trust

PODs: The <u>report</u> "Potential Operational Delineations and Northern New Mexico's 2019 Fire Season" gives a brief introduction to potential operational delineations (PODs) and quantitative wildfire risk assessments (QWRAs) before diving into a case study in the greater Santa Fe landscape.

Barriers & Opportunities: The authors of the <u>article</u> "Policy Barriers and Opportunities for Prescribed Fire Application in the Western United States" (Courtney A. Schultz, Sarah M. McCaffrey and Heidi R. Huber-Stearns) found that "lack of adequate capacity and funding were the most commonly cited barriers to increasing application of prescribed fire," and that collaborative forums and resource sharing are among the hallmarks of successful approaches.

Post-Fire Regeneration: The Northern Rockies Fire Science Network has published the <u>science</u> review "Post-fire Tree Regeneration (or Lack Thereof) Can Change Ecosystems." For more on the topic, see their post-fire tree regeneration webpage.

Trust: The <u>article</u> "Exploring Wildfire-Prone Community Trust in Wildfire Management Agencies" gives an introduction to the components of trust (expressed, for example, as competence, benevolence and honesty), and the reports on focus group results from five communities in the West. Among other things, the authors found that "trust was most often expressed in the context of agency abilities or competence, whereas distrust was framed in the context of intentions or the belief that the agency is not acting in the best interest of the community."

About the Watershed Research and Training Center

Tucked in rural Trinity County, the Watershed Research and Training Center (Watershed Center) has been cultivating triple-bottom-line solutions to forest conservation challenges since our founding in 1996. Our mission is to create and sustain healthy lands and healthy communities. What started as a project to re-train displaced loggers and mill workers in ecosystem management is now a vibrant nonprofit organization working locally, statewide and nationally.

In addition to putting dozens of our community members back to work in the woods each year, we lead several land and watershed conservation programs, coordinate state biomass and fire management partnerships, and have played an influential role in state and federal policy-making and program direction. Through our programs, we've built strong networks of partner leaders and practitioners dedicated to advancing local solutions and transferring their learning to improve land management and community well-being.

Our Statewide Forest and Fire Work

In May of 2019, the Watershed Center launched a Regional Forest and Fire Capacity (RFFC) Program, supported by the Department of Conservation and the California Natural Resources Agency. Through a grant from the Resource Legacy Fund, we have since expanded RFFC to include a Tribal Forest and Fire Project. The RFFC program is multi-faceted, involving dozens of state agency partners and over two hundred practitioners. It has an emphasis on capacity-building among community-based practitioners, particularly on finding opportunities for capacity to be leveraged through existing assets, peer learning and peer mentoring. There is also a technical service component, through which the Watershed Center deploys trainers to build a community's technical capacity in areas such as prescribed fire, forest management and community wildfire planning. This work involves numerous virtual meetings and webinars, and we plan to host 2-4 multi-day workshops (each for 30-60 people) in the next phase of the project. There is an element of state fire policy and planning inherent to this work, as the program is both funded by, and meant to inform, state programs and policy.

Job Summary and Activities

The Program Assistant will be responsible for providing administrative support to the Regional Forest and Fire Capacity Program Director (75%), and also providing administrative support (25%) to the Tribal Forest and Fire Project, under leadership of the Tribal Forest and Fire Project Manager. This will include:

 - Developing proficiency with Podio and training and onboarding users to the site.
 - Providing customer service to users, managing profiles and accounts

III.) Managing team documents:

- Organizing and managing an online resource library
- Creating and maintaining contact lists
- Filing and maintaining documents and records
- Performing other data entry as assigned

IV.) Creating and circulating promotional materials:

- Producing and editing electronic newsletters, including managing a MailChimp account
- Producing flyers and other materials
- Managing other communication platforms as needed

V.) Other, including

- Coordinating Program Director and other staff travel logistics
- Providing other program assistance as assigned

Compensation

Compensation for this position will be based on experience, within the range of \$18-26/hour. This is a full-time position with a benefit package including:

This position will likely be a remote position, though the Program Assistant must reside within the state of California at the time of employment. This position is full time and will require in-state, overnight travel. We will consider flexible work schedules to accommodate family or other commitments. The Program Assistant reports to the Regional Forest and Fire Capacity Program Director. While performing the duties of this job, the employee is regularly required to use a computer and phone and will occasionally need to lift and/or move up to 30 pounds.
