News from the Field

California: The **FireScape Mendocino** core team recently hosted a **field tour** to review burn severity and the efficacy of several fuel projects impacted by the August Complex Fire. Read a summary of some of their learning in the <u>blog post</u> "Post Wildfire Tour to **Review Efficacy of Fuel Projects**."

California: The ScienceLine article "Rethinking Who Should Set Prescribed Fires" describes how tribes and community organizations are ready to step in to increase our ability to conduct prescribed fire. Among those called out by name are the Karuk and Yurok tribes, the Watershed Research and Training Center, and the IPBN and TREX.

Nebraska: In a really nice conversation, **Ben Wheeler** (ben.wheeler@nebraska.gov) talks about the **benefits of fire** (and **TREX**) in the **podcast** episode "Fire—Why It's Good for Agriculture & Habitats" from the Ord Area Chamber of Commerce.

New Mexico: The **All Hands All Lands Burn Team** has announced the **six-month mobilization** a four-person **pile burn squad** to work on piled fuels in several counties in the northern part of the state. For more, see the media release from the **Forest Stewards Guild**.

South Dakota: The **Rapid City Fire Department** is working with a developer to make sure a new **development is built with wildland fire safety** in mind. Before construction begins, the 120-acre project is being thinned with an eye to both fire safety and aesthetics. Resources: Outreach Toolkit / Mastication / Liability / Smoke

Outreach Toolkit: The Washington Prescribed Fire Council has developed Put Fire to Work, a multifaceted toolkit to guide public engagement in support of prescribed fire. With a blend of advice and sample documents and visuals, the toolkit is relevant for work in Washington, the Pacific Northwest, and beyond.

Mastication: The November issue of the Rocky Mountain Research Station Science You Can Use Bulletin asks "Is Mastication Right for Your Site? Science-Based Decision Trees for Forest Managers." The decision trees address whether mastication is appropriate for an application, as well as the types of machinery suitable for the scale, location and goals of a project.

Liability: The new **Southern Fire Exchange** <u>fact sheet</u> "Recent Research on Perceived Risks, Legal Liabilities, and Insurance Coverage Associated with Prescribed Burning on Private Lands" **summarizes four recent articles** that examine **landowner perceptions** of legal liabilities, perceived risks, and insurance coverage associated with prescribed burning.

Smoke: A new version of the NWCG Smoke Management Guide for Prescribed Fire is now available as a pdf. (Hard copies will be available beginning in January through the NWCG catalog.) This guide will be the textbook for the RX-410 smoke class that is currently under revision.

Articles & Reports: Biodiversity / PODs / Quarantine

Biodiversity: "More than **4400 terrestrial and freshwater species** from a wide range of taxa and habitats face threats associated with modified fire regimes." The *Science* review article "Fire and Biodiversity in the Anthropocene" explores the causes and consequences of changes in fire activity—too much, too little, or the wrong kind of fire—and strategies to manage these changes.

PODs: An <u>addendum</u> to the spring 2020 <u>report</u> "Pre-Season Planning for Wildland Fire Response: An Assessment of the US Forest Service's Potential Operational Delineations (PODs)" has been released. It covers lessons from the 2019 fire season.

Quarantine: A recent <u>study</u>, "SARS-CoV-2 Transmission Among Marine Recruits During Quarantine," documented the **spread of the COVID-19 virus** in a group that **quarantined before coming together**, and **followed public health measures** during their quarantine. The University of Minnesota shared a <u>news release</u> summary of the findings.
