News from the Field

California: For a look at the spring **Plumas TREX** through the eyes of an artist, check out the <u>story</u> "Learning to Put Fire on the Ground" by **Laurie Wigham**, who joined the TREX to teach **nature journaling** as a way to develop and support observational skills.

Sierra magazine also has a <u>story</u>—"The Fine Art of Wildfire Awareness"—about "pyrosketchology," including **Miriam Morrill's pilot program** at the **2019 Klamath TREX**.

Georgia: In the Virginia Mercury <u>article</u> "The Smooth Coneflower Makes a Comeback," Mike Brod credits "being consistent with periodic prescribed fires" as critical to habitat restoration for this species. In late June the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service <u>proposed downlisting</u> the species from endangered to threatened.

North Carolina: With support from the FLN, the Forest Stewards Guild worked with the Mountain Valleys RC&D Council, North Carolina Forest Service and North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission to produce the <u>video</u> "Learning About Burning: An Introduction to Prescribed Fire for NC Landowners."

FAC Net: In 2019, the **Fire Adapted Communities Learning Network** launched an **Opportunity Fund** to help affiliate members push important projects to completion. Funding: JFSP

JFSP: The Joint Fire Science Program intends to request proposals through one or more Funding Opportunity Announcements beginning this month and remaining open for about two months. Proposals will be accepted for research on "social and ecological recovery of communities impacted by wildfire" and "collaborative development of ecosystem mapping products for fire and fuels management." Resources: Safety PSAs / Weather / HIZ

Safety PSAs: CBS 9 in San Diego has a <u>collection</u> of brief **videos** touching on air quality, evacuation and other **aspects of wildfire safety** for community members.

Weather: June updates of the **NWCG publications** "Guide to Fire Weather Forecasts" (<u>PMS 425</u>) and "Fire Weather" (<u>PMS 425-1</u>) are now available.

HIZ: The **Colorado State Forest Service** has updated "The **Home Ignition Zone**." The <u>guide</u> includes both **general principles** for creating and maintaining defensible space, and information on fuel and forest types found in Colorado.

Articles & Reports: Fuels, Beetles & Drought / Greenbelts / Insurance / Pyrodiversity

Fuels, Beetles & Drought: The authors of the <u>article</u> "Do Forest **Fuel Reduction Treatments** Confer Resistance to Beetle Infestation and Drought Mortality?" took advantage of a **natural experiment** when the 2012-2016 drought affected research plots at the Teakettle Experimental Forest in the Sierra NF. The effects on the more than 10,000 mapped and tagged trees were complex. "Density reduction treatments that rely on **mechanical thinning alone** had **neutral to positive** effects on conifer survival during the 2012–2016 drought.... **Prescribed burning** appears less effective than mechanical thinning at reducing drought mortality and in some cases **can lead to higher beetle infestation** and mortality rates."

Greenbelts: The Greenbelt Alliance <u>white paper</u> "The Critical Role of Greenbelts in **Wildfire Resilience**" looks at the roles **four types of greenbelts** (properly maintained) can play in protecting communities from wildfire.

Insurance: The <u>report</u> "Wildfire Resilience Insurance: **Quantifying the Risk Reduction** of Ecological Forestry with Insurance" was co-authored by **The Nature Conservancy** and **Willis Towers Watson**. It shows how **ecological forestry**—thinning and prescribed burning—can reduce insurance costs, increase its availability, and reduce the likelihood of extreme wildfires in high risk areas. Pyrodiversity: The <u>article</u> "**Quantifying Pyrodiversity** and Its Drivers" lays out a multi-factor method for capturing pyrodiversity, and applies it to forests of the western U.S. "While we demonstrate its utility at the regional scale, the 30 m resolution of the underlying **data also allow calculation** of pyrodiversity at scales relevant to **point or plot-based** ecological sampling methods."

In the News: Federal Policy / USFS Chief / Pyrocene / Beavers

Federal Policy: Last week the **White House** released "<u>Fact Sheet</u>: The Biden-Harris Administration Acts to **Address the Growing Wildfire Threat**," which outlines planned actions to meet the challenges of what is expected to be a severe wildfire season.
