# News from the Field

**Arizona**: The **Flagstaff TREX** made the 2021 Environmental **Year in Review** <u>list</u> compiled by Flagstaff's newspaper, the *Arizona Daily Sun*. For more, see the <u>Notes from the Field</u> from this TREX.

**California**: The **Butte County Cal-TREX** kicked off with a **training weekend in November**, and is continuing as an **on-call burn team** through the end of February. To date, 109 participants have worked on 13 burns, completing 364 acres of prescribed fire on private and Forest Service land.

North Carolina: Partners in the High Country FLN landscape (SBR FLN) are hosting a learn-andburn event for private landowners at New River State Park on February 11 (register). Event organizers are planning on a one-acre demonstration burn, but may tackle the entire 18-acre unit if weather and staff capacity permit. In addition to the burn, Charlie Faire (Ruffed Grouse Society), coordinator of the newly funded Southern Blue Ridge Prescribed Burn Association, will meet with participants to build interest in private lands burning. # Resources: Geysering / Wildfire 101 Videos / Burnout / Emergency Guides for Residents

**Geysering**: The **NWCG Equipment Technology Committee** released an **equipment advisory** last week. The brief <u>document</u> describes two conditions under which **fuel containers** can geyser, and actions that can reduce this risk.

**Wildfire 101 Videos**: The **Northwest Fire Science Consortium** has partnered with the **University of Oregon Center for Science Communication** to create a set of three **one-minute videos** that introduce **key wildfire concepts** (the <u>fire triangle</u> and <u>red flag weather</u>) and tips for dealing with <u>smoke</u>. The videos mention the Northwest, but are otherwise widely applicable.

**Burnout**: For those starting the new year feeling less than fresh, the **FAC Net** <u>blog post</u> "It's Not Just You: Burnout and Stress in the Practitioner Community" may be useful. It has **firsthand accounts** from practitioners in the Fire Networks, and closes with links to some **resources for recharging**.

**Emergency Guides for Residents**: The **British Colombia** government has an easy-to-use set of **emergency planning** <u>guides</u>. These include a household **fill-in-the-blank** plan, and supporting plans for special situations (e.g., apartments, seniors, pets).

Last week, **Colorado State University Extension** has published an updated "**After the Disaster Guidebook**" for <u>Boulder County</u>, as well as a <u>template that can be adapted</u> to other locales. The guides have checklists and resources for residents in the immediate aftermath of wildfire.

The **Tahoe Fire Adapted Communities Network** has created the <u>brochure</u> "**Prepare Now** for Wildfires: A Guide for Lake Tahoe **Long-Term Renters**," which addresses an group often overlooked in preparation guidelines for homeowners. # Articles & Reports: Woody Encroachment / Soil Carbon / Adaptive Management / Boundaries / Treatment Planning / Psychological Safety

**Woody Encroachment**: "Reducing Woody Encroachment in Grasslands: A Guide for **Understanding Risk and Vulnerability**" provides a **scientific foundation for managing rangeland systems** that are vulnerable to woody encroachment. The <u>guide</u> uses eastern redcedar as a featured example, but its principles are widely applicable across native grasslands that are being encroached upon by both native and nonnative woodland vegetation.

**Soil Carbon**: The *Nature Geoscience* <u>article</u> "**Fire Effects** on the Persistence of **Soil Organic Matter** and Long-Term Carbon Storage" has been <u>summarized</u> on *ScienceDaily*. The authors argue that using fire to promote soil organic matter stability may be an important **nature-based climate solution**.

Adaptive Management: The Ecology and Society article "Capturing Practitioners' 'How-to' Knowledge in the Form of Recommendations for More Effective Planning of Collaborative Adaptive Management Projects" is based on interviews with practitioners from ten projects. Themes that emerged are discussed, and the authors concluded that "the most important take-away for practitioners ... is that there is real value in taking time up front to reach out to communities and work on building trust."

**Boundaries**: The high-level JFSP project <u>report</u> "Exploring **Boundary Spanning Features**" addresses **several types of boundaries**—land ownership, functional, organizational and conceptual—that can complicate fire management. "Boundary spanning features are **concepts**, **objects**, **settings**, **and organizations** that may help **bridge disconnects and differences** between actors by creating more opportunities for them to understand each other, share resources and responsibilities, and work together."

**Treatment Planning**: The <u>paper</u> "Planning for Future Fire: Scenario Analysis of an **Accelerated Fuel Reduction Plan** for the Western United States" by Alan Ager and colleagues lays out a method for planning fuel treatments based on the **goal of reducing building exposure** from wildfires on national forests.

**Psychological Safety**: Much of the <u>December issue</u> of *Fire Management Today* is devoted to the Forest Service's **broadening of its focus on safety** to include psychological and emotional safety. A variety of voices shares their understanding of psychological safety and its benefits—or necessity—and several discuss the intersectionality of psychological safety and diversity/inclusion in the fire management world.

# In the News: Facing Fire / Suburban Fire / Longleaf Beer

**Facing Fire**: In the <u>essay</u> "This Isn't the California I Married," Elizabeth Weil lays out the fire situation in California—and some of the **shifts needed** in our thinking about **fire, the present and the future**.

**Suburban Fire**: The *New York Magazine* <u>article</u> "The Return of the Urban Firestorm—**What Happened in Colorado** Was Something Much Scarier Than a Wildfire" is a wide-ranging interview with climate scientist **Daniel Swain**, speaking just after the Marshall Fire in Colorado. It covers the interplay of **climate and weather**, the nexus of **wildland fire and urban conflagration**, and the inevitability of **risk**.

**Longleaf Beer**: In **Longleaf India Pale Ale**, a brewer in Virginia didn't just give a nod to an important local species in the beer's name—it's **brewed with branches and needles** from the trees.
