News from the Field

California: Lenya Quinn-Davidson, Don Hankins and Sasha Berleman were part of the conversation on the PBS News Hour Weekend <u>piece</u> "Communities Are Embracing 'Controlled Burns' to Protect Themselves" a couple weeks ago. They—along with the burning they are facilitating—were also featured in the *Bay Nature* magazine <u>article</u> "Learn to Burn" (which has some lovely photos by Sashwa Burrous).

Georgia: "Why We Burn" is an <u>article</u> in this month's *Georgia Magazine*. **Georgia Blue Ridge Mountains** landscape co-lead **Phil Delestrez**, with the Georgia Department of Natural Resources Parks and Historic Sites Division, is quoted on **prescribed fire use in state parks**, including Tallulah Gorge. The magazine is delivered to 560,000 Georgia residents and has an estimated readership of one million.

Minnesota: The <u>article</u> "How **Indigenous Burning Practices** Could Revitalize a Northern Minnesota Forest" talks about how the **Leech Lake Band of Ojibwe** are working to bring fire back to the forest, and how the **IPBN** and **TREX** play a part.

Minnesota: A bit further north, **FAC Net** partners in Ely hosted a successful **hands-on chainsaw safety** and pile building class for residents. Read more in the <u>article</u> "Hands-on Lessons in Chainsaw Safety," or contact **Gloria Erickson** (<u>gloria@dovetailinc.org</u>).

Missouri: **The Nature Conservancy** in Missouri recently developed and led a **diversity**, **equity and inclusion prescribed fire workshop** to increase opportunities for women and others who have traditionally been underrepresented in the field to further their fire leadership knowledge and qualifications. **Kelly Martin**, a burn boss for the **North America Fire** program, helped guide and mentor workshop participants, and <u>spoke with CNN</u> about her experiences in fire.

Oregon: The **Rogue Valley Prescribed Burn Association**—the first PBA in the state—now has a **website**: <u>https://www.roguevalleypba.com/</u>.

WTREX: The **Women-in-Fire TREX** is underway near Wakefield, Virginia, with more than 30 people from 14 states and four countries taking part. **Photos and updates** are being posted on the <u>TREX</u> <u>Facebook</u> page, and public radio station <u>WHRO</u> spoke with some participants as they conducted a **burn at TNC's Piney Grove Preserve** last week.

Funding: CFLRP

CFLRP: The **Collaborative Forest Landscape Restoration Program** is <u>requesting proposals</u> for projects for potential funding in **FY2023**. In addition to the material on the CFLRP website, see the <u>summary memo</u>; there will also be a **webinar** for interested applicants on April 11 at 11:30 Eastern (<u>calendar invite</u>).

Feedback Requested: TREX Resources

TREX Resources: **The Ember Alliance** is seeking feedback on three resources they are producing to support Prescribed Fire Training Exchanges and cooperative burning and training events:

- The TREX Medical Risk Management Guide improves medical safety planning of training events and the Pocket Medical Risk Management Guide improves medical safety in the field —read the planning guide and the pocket guide and take the improvement survey about them.
- The **TREX Activity Workbook** provides useful training activities in a "plug and play" format read the workbook and take the improvement survey about it.

Resources: Fire Shelters / Evacuation / Getting Qualified / Programming Delivery / IFTDSS / Grasses

Fire Shelters: According to **NWCG**, "recent analysis of fire shelter deployments confirms that **design improvements** implemented in **2006** provide an **increased margin of safety** for firefighters." See the <u>equipment advisory</u> released last month for details.

Evacuation: The **Fire Adapted Communities Learning Network** recently hosted a **peer-learning group**, in which 100 practitioners addressed evacuation planning. Highlights from their work together can be found in the FAC Net <u>blog post</u> "Evacuation: A **Resource Round-Up**."

Getting Qualified: **The Nature Conservancy** has just published the <u>brief guide</u>, "Wildland Firefighting Online Training." It briefly outlines the **requirements for FFT2 qualification**, with links to **online** coursework and detailed instructions for setting up an account with FEMA to access the courses.

Programming Delivery: **Southern Regional Extension Forestry** has released "Extension, Education and Outreach Forestry and/or Natural Resource **Programming Delivery Mode & Fees** Survey Report." The <u>report</u>, based on a **November 2020 survey** of extension and other outreach professionals, includes changes made because of COVID.

IFTDSS: The **Northern Rockies Fire Science Network** collaborated with team members of the **Interagency Fuels Treatment Decision Support System** to create an introduction to this planning program in <u>Story Map form</u>, with plenty of links to learn more.

Grasses: The **Invasive Annual Grass Spatial Data Compilation** and Synthesis Project has developed an <u>online database</u> of invasive annual grass spatial products. Supporting documents include a brief <u>user guide</u> and a <u>compendium</u> of brief overviews of a couple dozen data sets.

Articles & Reports: Indigenous Burning / Non-Forest Fires / Fire & Birds / Extreme Rainfall / Fire Ecology

Indigenous Burning: The *ScienceDaily* <u>post</u> "How Indigenous Burning **Shaped the Klamath's Forests** for a Millennia" summarizes the <u>article</u> "Land Management Explains Major Trends in Forest Structure and Composition Over the Last Millennium in California's Klamath Mountains," a study that combined **Western scientific methods** and **oral histories** from the **Karuk** and **Yurok** tribes.

Non-Forest Fires: Much of the political and scientific discussion of devastating wildfires revolves around forest management, which oversimplifies the problem. The **California Fire Science Consortium** has released the <u>research brief</u> "**California Wildland Fires Burning Mostly in Non-Forests**," which summarizes the <u>article</u> "Spatial Overlap of Wildfire and Biodiversity in California Highlights Gap in Non-Conifer Fire Research and Management."

Fire & Birds: The *Fire Ecology* <u>article</u> **"Prescribed Fire** Limits Wildfire Severity Without Altering Ecological Importance for Birds" is based on research on the Payette National Forest in Idaho.

Extreme Rainfall: A recent *ScienceDaily* <u>post</u> summarizes the <u>article</u> "Climate Change Increases Risk of **Extreme Rainfall Following Wildfire** in the Western United States." The effects—including debris flows, mudslides and flash floods—are expected to be **most notable in the Pacific Northwest**.

Fire Ecology: The **comprehensive book** "Fire Ecology and Management: Past, Present and Future of U.S. Forested Ecosystems" was published last year. Nine of its 12 chapters have authors from the U.S. Forest Service, and so are <u>available in pdf form</u>.

In the News: Combustion / Indigenous Fire / Record Rx / DOI Plan

Combustion: A recent <u>essay</u> in *The New Yorker*, "In a **World on Fire, Stop Burning Things**," offers a **hopeful view** of addressing climate change through available technology that doesn't rely on combustion. It closes by noting **one** "**sublime exception**" to our need to be dousing fires—burning for land management, as it has been used over millennia (with **Frank Lake** and the **IPBN** mentioned as rekindling this relationship).

Indigenous Fire: Over the weekend, CNN <u>reported</u> "California Once Prohibited Native American Fire Practices. Now, It's Asking Tribes to Use Them to **Help Prevent Wildfires**."

Record Rx: There's good news in an <u>article</u> in *Greenwire*, "**Prescribed Burns Hit a Record in 2021**, **Forest Service** Says." Most of the article is behind a paywall, but the lead image is visible—and shows participants conducting a burn during the fall 2021 **Yurok Cultural Burn Training Exchange**.

DOI Plan: The **U.S. Department of the Interior** has just released its "**Wildfire Risk Five-Year Monitoring, Maintenance, and Treatment Plan**." The <u>plan</u> is in response to the **Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act**, and complements the Forest Service's "Confronting the Wildfire Crisis" <u>plan</u>.

Our Forest, Our Collaborative, and Our Work

The Deschutes National Forest is an extremely important wildlife habitat, an economic engine for our region, a source of clean and abundant water, and a world-class recreational playground. The Forest is the backdrop of our lives, a core piece of our identity as Central Oregonians. But community help is needed to preserve these values and to improve the health and resiliency of the forest. Restoration also reduces the risk of catastrophic wildfire to our community and provides green jobs in our local economy.

The Deschutes Collaborative Forest Project (DCFP) is guided by a 19-member Steering Committee made up of diverse interested community members. We are wildlife biologists, fire fighters, forestry contractors, environmentalists, outdoor recreationists, tribal representatives, foresters, research scientists, local government leaders and more.

We bring our diverse perspectives and expertise to a common table, review on-the-ground conditions and needs on the Forest, honor all values and experiences, and develop community-level agreements on how we want the Forest to be managed and restored. We ask the Forest Service to implement these agreements and we strive to explain to the community why our vision of active restoration is the right one for our local forests.

Between 2009 and today, the DCFP has helped to overcome past gridlock to improve forest health, fish and wildlife habitat, and resiliency to fire, insects, disease and climate change across a 250,000 acre landscape within the Deschutes National Forest stretching between Black Butte Ranch and Sunriver, wrapping around Sisters and Bend. Now we are expanding that work across the entire 1.6 million acre Deschutes National Forest.

Key Responsibilities

- Facilitating regular meetings of the DCFP Steering Committee and Sub-Committees focused on Restoration Planning, Outreach and Communications, Prescribed Fire, Monitoring, and Administration. (2-4 meetings per month)
- Supporting Steering and Sub-Committee chairs in determining desired outcomes for meetings, building agendas, facilitation, and ensuring action items are implemented



- Organizing and coordinating field trips, science workshops, monitoring activities, research activities, and community presentations necessary to advance the DCFP's work
- Ensuring consistent communication between and among the DCFP and all Steering Committee and Sub-Committee members - through email and Google Workspace docs on meeting invites, agendas, minutes, project updates, and other relevant information
- Act as the primary liaison between the DCFP and the Forest Service ensuring the DCFP is receiving essential information for deliberations and supporting the agency in implementing restoration consistent with DCFP agreements and recommendations
- Lead a review and update of the DCFP Strategic Plan and help the DCFP reorganize to implement the resulting priorities.
- Oversight and support of Outreach, Monitoring, Administrative or other contracted staff to the DCFP to ensure Steering and Sub-Committee goals are being accomplished
- Management of the DCFP budget and grants with the support of a bookkeeper and other staff at our fiscal sponsor, the Central Oregon Forest Stewardship Foundation.
- Ideally, the Program Manager will also be able to build relationships with funders and assist with proposal development.

Desired Qualifications

- Passion for the mission of the DCFP and ability to exemplify our mission and values
- Demonstrated ability to facilitate dialog with diverse people representing a broad spectrum of interests leading stakeholders through complex, respectful, and proactive deliberation to agreements and decisions
- Exceptional organizational and prioritization skills; detail and solution oriented.
- Excellent verbal and written communication skills at both the organizational and community levels
- Proven ability to foster consensus among diverse interests to solve problems and deliver outcomes.
- Knowledge of federal forest management, ecological restoration principles and processes, and collaborative problem solving in the public sector.
- Self-motivated and innovative
- Experience with grant writing, major donor fundraising, and financial management is a plus.
