News from the Field

California: **Michael Wara** and **Bill Tripp** spoke with Marketplace radio for the <u>story</u> "When **Prescribed Burns** Spiral Into Devastating Wildfires, **Who Pays** the Price?"

Maine: September's Maine TREX, the first TREX in the Northeast, was a thoroughly successful event—despite the rain, chilly weather and a hurricane-driven wind shift. Check out the North Atlantic Fire Science Exchange <u>blog post</u> for a good overview of the event by Amanda Mahaffey (<u>amanda@forestguild.org</u>). Another piece, on the Maine Department of Inland Fisheries and Water <u>blog</u>, takes a **deep dive into a burn** conducted at the Kennebunk Plains WMA.

Maryland: *Biohabitats* has an interview with Potomac Headwaters FLN landscape lead Deborah Landau (<u>dlandau@tnc.org</u>) in its <u>fall equinox issue</u>. In it, she talks about how she developed an interest in fire during her studies in entomology and plant biology, how prescribed fire is used to support **biodiversity**, and what goes into planning and implementing a prescribed burn.

Montana/Wyoming: The Island Park Sustainable Fire Community is expanding to the Greater Yellowstone Area. The newly formed Greater Yellowstone Fire Action Network (GYFAN) met for its first in-person workshop in mid-October, focusing on crafting messages. People from all walks of wildfire fire mitigation life were present, with representation from organizations including fire adapted community groups, fire departments, a local county commission, the Bureau of Indian Affairs, U.S. Forest Service, The Nature Conservancy and FLN staff. North Carolina: In September, several Southern Blue Ridge FLN partners—led by the new Southern Blue Ridge Prescribed Burn Association and the Forest Stewards Guild—held a Fire Fair for new (and potential) PBA members, college students, landowners and community members. Read more in the latest Notes from the Field—including links to four public Learn-and-Burn events being held in November and December.

Canada: The Canadian Prairies Prescribed Fire Training Exchange—the first TREX in Canada took place in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, in the middle of October. Forty people took part—including TREX coaches Brad Elder (brad.elder@doane.edu) and Kody Wohlers (kwohlers@inhf.org). In spite of drought, participants were able to burn on the majority of days. Among the training highlights, six burn bosses gained experience and mentoring in their leadership roles, supporting a key capacity need in the region. Funding: JFSP

JFSP: The Joint Fire Science Program has several funding announcements <u>open</u> through **December 20**. These include the **Graduate Research Innovation** (GRIN) Award for U.S. graduate students in wildland fire and related fields.

Input Requested: Rx Implementation / Wildfire Commission

Rx Implementation: A group of partners led by the **Rural Voices for Conservation Coalition** (and including the **FLN**) is conducting a **national survey** to better understand **current capacity for and barriers to prescribed fire**. Visit the <u>survey website</u> for more information and a link to the survey, which is open through **November 30**.

Wildfire Commission: The federal Wildland Fire Mitigation and Management Commission has held its first couple of meetings, and workgroups have begun discussing several topics. Other workgroups will take up additional topics over the next few months. You can now submit recommendations <u>via a web form</u> to the four current workgroups: aviation strategy, Cohesive Strategy, landscapes and communities. (The remainder of the topics, and when recommendations will be accepted for each, are also on that page.)

Resources: Land Use Planning / Evacuation / R9 CWPPs

Land Use Planning: Headwaters Economics has developed <u>Firetopia</u>, a new toolbox for community land use planning for wildfire, with examples and resources in five topic areas—community plans, land development, building and fire codes, fuels treatment, and funding and engagement.

Evacuation: Each issue of *The FAC Circular*, FAC Net's monthly newsletter, focuses on one of the ten aspects of fire adapted communities work depicted in the FAC graphic (English, Spanish). The October issue covers safety and evacuation, linking to numerous resources, blog posts and other information. You can stay in the FAC loop by subscribing to this newsletter.

R9 CWPPs: The **Forest Service** has a <u>dashboard</u> for Community Wildfire Protection Plans in the **Eastern Region** (R9); it includes a **map and basic data** on each plan.

Articles & Reports: Resilience / Environmental Justice / Outreach / Aspen

Forest Resilience: The **U.S. Forest Service** <u>fact sheet</u> "Management To **Improve Forest Resilience** and **Reduce Wildfire Risk**" gives a brief overview of the topic, with **numerous links** to articles, syntheses and resources.

Environmental Justice: The authors of the <u>article</u> "A Burning Issue: Reviewing the Socio-Demographic and Environmental Justice Aspects of the **Wildfire Literature**" explored the Englishlanguage wildfire literature from around the world, laying out **four components of environmental justice** (EJ) as it pertains to wildfire. They recommend that EJ be used in environmental policy and management efforts—but as a **lens or framework**, rather than quantitative or binary metric.

Outreach: Authors of the <u>paper</u> "**Comparing Land Manager and Community Perceptions** of a Colorado Prescribed Fire Outreach Program" conducted interviews of "information providers" and "outreach targets" in a landscape in northern Colorado, having **each group assess** the effectiveness of **the communication**. Although the sample size was small, some interesting findings emerged. For example, common phrases can mean different things: "Notably, outreach targets often interpreted the term 'forest restoration' differently than information providers," in this case as a return to some historical condition, rather than a suite of forest health measures. The needs of "outreach targets" also **evolve through time**.

Aspen: The **Southern Rockies Fire Science Network** has compiled a workshop <u>summary</u> from the August **Colorado Aspen Summit**. One item highlighted is a **unique post-fire issue**: fire-hardened spikes from small stems rising from rhizomes—management suggestions are welcomed.

In the News: Rx Liability / Flood Insurance

Rx Liability: In the <u>piece</u> "Empowering Private Landowners to Prevent Wildfires," *Stanford News* interviewed **Michael Wara** about California's new \$20 million **liability fund**, focusing on the need for **more private land burning**—and developing a **realistic view of its risks**.

Flood Insurance: FEMA recently put out a <u>press release</u> (<u>Spanish version</u>) urging even those not living on flood plains to consider carrying flood insurance. "Unlike many causes of damage, **flooding and mudflows** are generally **not covered by a homeowners' policy**."
