News from the Field

California: There's more news from last fall's TREX season in the state. Read about the first TREX in Southern California—the Santa Barbara TREX, held in November—in the latest <u>Notes from the Field</u>. And from the North Bay TREX, which ran through early January, there's the <u>blog post</u> "Prescribed fire Training Is Underway With a List of Properties Prepped for Good Fire" as well as a CAL FIRE <u>video</u> filmed when the agency assisted at a TREX burn.

California: The Western Klamath Restoration Partnership (WKRP) has released its 2022 annual report, which includes pages on the Klamath TREX and the Karuk Women's TREX.

New Mexico: Gabe Kohler (gabe@forestguild.org) reported on the New Mexico Wildland Urban Fire Summit, which the Forest Stewards Guild helped host in November.

Portugal: You can follow the **Alto Minho TREX**, **now underway** in the northern part of the country, **on social media**, including Facebook (<u>altominho.trex</u>), Instagram (am_trex) and Twitter (<u>@TREXAlto</u> and #AltoMinhoTREX2023).

WTREX: A Women-in-Fire TREX gets started next Monday in southeastern North Carolina. You can follow WTREX on Facebook, and now on Instagram as well. This is the first of three WTREX this spring, with an event in South Africa in March and one in Canada in May (which is accepting applications through today; see the Prescribed Fire Training Exchanges section below).

Input Requested: Wildfire Commission / Cultural Fire / Californians

Wildfire Commission: The federal **Wildland Fire Mitigation and Management Commission** has held its first couple of meetings, and workgroups have begun discussing several topics. Other workgroups will take up the remainder of the topics over the next few months. Through February 22 you can **submit recommendations** <u>via a web form</u> to the groups working on **science**, **data and technology** and **public health and infrastructure**. (All topics, and when recommendations will be accepted for each, are also on that page.)

Cultural Fire: Researchers at the **USGS Climate Adaptation Science Centers** are interested in the **opinions of any fire practitioners** on the subject of traditional and cultural burn operations and **Indigenous fire practices** in particular. This research will be used in a **national synthesis effort** regarding the future of fire use in the U.S. <u>Take the survey</u>.

Californians: University of California Cooperative Extension is conducting a survey of California residents and natural resource professionals to guide extension programming. The 15-minute survey, available in English and Spanish, asks about gaps in programming and resources, challenges community members face in addressing wildfire risk, ability to make property management decisions and prepare for wildfire, and acceptability of prescribed fire and other fuels treatments. Please respond by February 28.

Resources: Estimating Carbon / Firewise Plants / Social Media / Traumatic Imagery / Fire Festivals / Inclusivity

Estimating Carbon: A general technical report from the **Forest Service Northern Research Station**, "**Standard Estimates of Forest Ecosystem Carbon** for Forest Types in the United States," updates a similar 2006 publication to provide ecosystem carbon yield tables for **53 forest types within 11 regions** of the U.S. According to the USFS R&D newsletter, "While regional estimates are not as accurate as site specific data, they provide a reasonable estimate of expected carbon stocks when site-specific data are not available."

Firewise Plants: The <u>publication</u> "Fire in the Wildland-Urban Interface: **Preparing a Firewise Plant** List for WUI Residents" from **University of Florida Extension** includes a **decision framework** for assessing species and other guidance for developing a local list.

Social Media: The **Washington Fire Adapted Communities Learning Network** has a comprehensive (but simple!) <u>five-page guide</u>, "How to **Use Social Media Effectively** in Communicating about Community Fire Adaptation." It includes links to recordings of a three-part workshop, as well as tools to help with **strategy**, **content and evaluation**.

Traumatic Imagery: The **Dart Center for Journalism & Trauma** has developed **guidelines** for **minimizing trauma** that can occur from **exposure to distressing images**, including those from natural disasters. While intended for journalists, "<u>Working With Traumatic Imagery</u>" has practical advice for anyone who, for example, is exposed to a high volume of wildfire disaster imagery.

Fire Festivals: A number of public fire festivals are held in the Southeast. In a concise <u>post</u>, **North Carolina State University** offers some **tips for starting a festival** to promote your messages, and includes links to several recurring festivals and other resources.

Inclusivity: The North Carolina-based NGO <u>Field Inclusive</u> "amplifies and supports marginalized and historically excluded individuals who professionally work outdoors in any natural resources field." <u>Slides and recordings</u> of sessions from last month's **Field Inclusive Week** cover topics including field safety, challenging stereotypes, mental health, and navigating the world as a disabled scientist.

Articles & Reports: Private Rx / Fuel Treatments / Forest Change / MOUs / Science / Wildfire Economics

Private Rx: The <u>report</u> "Burn Back Better: How Western States Can Encourage Prescribed Fire on Private Lands" is a collaboration between the Property and Environment Research Center and Tall Timbers Research Station. The authors outline five broad areas where progress can be made.

Fuel Treatments: The authors of the <u>technical note</u> "A Framework for Quantifying Forest Wildfire Hazard and Fuel **Treatment Effectiveness** From Stands to Landscapes" propose a model for evaluating treatment effectiveness **over space and time**, rather than as single treatment or wildfire events. They conclude that "not all fuel treatments will be effective, but our framework and dashboard allow the **outcomes of single fires** to be put in the **context of landscape trends**."

Forest Change: The <u>article</u> "Patterns and Drivers of Recent Land Cover Change on two Trailing-Edge Forest Landscapes" documents changes in the Prescott and Tonto national forests in **Arizona** from **1985 through 2020**. While the decline in forest extent was small (<1%), there were considerable changes in forest composition as a result of disturbances including wildfire, drought and insects. Highlights of the article are in a <u>fact sheet</u> from the **Ecological Restoration Institute**.

MOUs: The authors of the <u>article</u> "Fanning the Flames of Cooperation: A **Collective Action Approach** to **Prescribed Fire Agreements**" analyzed a dataset of 21 agreements in the U.S. Southeast and identified **six emergent themes**—including that the agreements have little impact on liability.

Science: The *Science You Can Use* <u>bulletin</u> "Getting More Fire on the Ground: **Landscape-Scale Prescribed Burning Supported by Science**" takes a tour of some examples of the science that can support the call for action in the Forest Service's new 10-year plan, "Confronting the Wildfire Crisis." It includes a selection of **further reading**, from social science to PODs.

Wildfire Economics: The *Annual Review of Resource Economics* article "The Economics of Wildfire in the United States" lays out the **economic dimensions of wildfire**—including direct costs, mitigations, wildfire response and post-fire impacts—and identifies **knowledge gaps**.

In the News: USFS-Tribal Relations / Post-Marshall Fire

USFS-Tribal Relations: The Forest Service has <u>announced</u> the release of "**Strengthening Tribal Consultations and Nation-to-Nation Relationships**: A **USDA Forest Service** <u>Action Plan</u>." The State & Private Forestry deputy chief area has also been renamed **State**, **Private & Tribal Forestry**.

Post-Marshall Fire: A year after the fire burned more than 1,000 structures, **Colorado Public Radio** ran the <u>story</u> "A **Year After the Marshall Fire**, Boulder Communities Are Taking **Fire Mitigation Into the Plains**." Five approaches, from home hardening to prescribed fire, are discussed.

Washington DNR Certified Prescribed Burn Manager Course May 23-25, 2023 - Deer Park, WA

Greetings,

I invite you to attend the third offering of the DNR's Certified Prescribed Burn Manager course. This will be a 3-day in-person course held at the Spokane County Fire District 4's Community Center in Deer Park, WA on May 23-25th, 2023. The cost will be \$100. The course will consist of:

- Approximately 4 hours of Pre-work that will be sent out to students.
- Two 8-hour classroom days covering Prescribed Burn content
- A morning field event, followed by an afternoon exam

As a component of the certification process, a student with a passing grade on the exam will coordinate an evaluation burn. The student will **lead** a prescribed burn while being evaluated by the Certified Burner Program Manager. If all areas of the evaluation are satisfactory the student will be recommended for certification.

Please email Kyle Lapham; kyle.lapham@dnr.wa.gov in order to enroll your nomination, the class will be limited to 25 students. The deadline for nominations is April 10th, 2023.

The <u>nomination form</u> will have you provide a short description of your prescribed fire experience to aid in the selection process. No pre-requisites are required.

Food and Lodging will not be provided, please plan accordingly.
