Vision and Relationships	Basis for cooperation is usually between individuals but may be mandated Organizational mission & goals are not considered Interaction is on an as needed basis/no time limit	Individual relationships are supported by their organizations Mission and goals of the organizations are reviewed for compatibility Interaction usually around one specific project or task	Commitment of the organization is fully behind the individual Common, new mission and goals are created One or more projects are undertaken for longerterm results
