## News from the Field

**California**: The **Western Klamath Restoration Partnership** has nicely **summarized its collaborative planning** work and landscape analysis—and the vision and project plans that resulted from them—in a comprehensive <u>poster</u> shared at the **Northern California Prescribed Fire Council conference** last month.

Washington: Northwest Public Radio ran a <u>story</u> in November on the Carlton Complex wildfire, in the Methow Valley. In the interview, Susan Prichard, Reese Lolley and Matt Dahlgreen talk about how forest treatments—and careful use of wildfires—can be used to help manage future wildfires.

**Bats**: Many forest bats have significantly declined in the eastern U.S. due to **white-nose syndrome**, a fungal disease. As a result, the **U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service** is <u>currently considering</u> whether the **northern long-eared bat** (*Myotis septentrionalis*) should **be listed as threatened**. A number of partners from the **Central Appalachians**, **South Central** and **Southern Blue Ridge FLN**s have **shared their expertise and experience** through the **comment process**. Should the bat be listed, they suggest that provisions be included to **allow for sustainable forest management**, including controlled burning, that will permit habitat creation and restoration, and encourage the long-term sustainability and health the forest and freshwater systems.

**Field Guide**: An **expanded version** of the <u>Learning Networks Field Guide</u> is now available, which includes the **FAC Learning Network** and 2014 **TREX** as well as the **FLN**. (The FLN-only version can still be accessed through a link at the bottom of that page; the FAC LN pages will also be gathered into a separate document, soon to be available on <u>http://facnetwork.org/</u>.) In addition to pages for **regional FLNs**, **FAC hub organizations** and the eight 2014 **TREX events**, the guide has **brief introductions** to the FLN and FAC LN and **indexes** that cross-reference the landscapes and hubs by areas of expertise, habitat type, strategies being used and many other variables. ## Cohesive Strategy: Priority Maps

**Priority Maps**: The <u>Cohesive Strategy website</u> has a set of **four maps** that show, at the **county level**, national **priority places** in four areas: **broad-scale fuels management** (as opposed to hazard reduction near structures), **community planning and coordination**, managing **human-caused ignitions**, and opportunities for **managing wildfires for resource objectives**. If you're reading this, your county is probably a high priority on at least one of the maps (and a look at the big picture is always interesting).

## Resources: 1000 Words / LANDFIRE Bulletins / Geospatial Technologies

**1000 Words**: If you **need to communicate** (and you do), consider **strengthening your visual skills** as well as verbal ones. Given the amount of information we must all process on a daily basis, it's easy to argue that **a good picture** is a good deal more **valuable** than a thousand words in many cases. On the **FAC Learning Network** blog, **Michelle Medley-Daniel** has a series of **quick reads** on how to help your pictures tell the story. <u>General tips</u> are in the first post of the series, followed by a post that covers some fire- and FAC-<u>specific suggestions</u>.

Also check out the **Firewise** <u>collection of photos</u> (of community meetings, good landscaping, hazards, etc.) that can be used in presentations—or as **inspiration** for developing your own local photo library.

**Geospatial Technologies**: The **National Fire Protection Association** has released the <u>report</u> "A Collection of Geospatial Technological Approaches for Wildland and Wildland Urban Interface (WUI) Fire Events." As the title suggests, it is a thorough (if dry) catalog of applicable **GIS**, **remote sensing** and **global positioning applications** now available.

## Articles & Briefs: Social Constraints / Vapor Pressure Deficits

**Social Constraints**: The **California Fire Science Consortium** <u>brief</u> "Social Constraints to **Mitigation in a WUI Community**" reports on a survey of a community in the Sierra-Cascade foothills. Among the findings were that many of the highly-valued environmental characteristics were also wildfire risk factors, and that many residents see adequate fire suppression as a substitute for mitigation.

Vapor Pressure Deficits: It's not just the heat, it's the (lack of) humidity. A story on <u>Climate Central</u> talks about the effects of forecast continuing vapor pressure deficits (an indicator of the **evaporative power** of air) on the forests of the Southwest, as high-VPD years like 2011 could become a new normal.

Prescribed fire is being used to manage eastern redcedar and promote habitat for grassland-dependent species such as the greater prairie chicken. The TREX is a partnership between Pheasants Forever, The Nature Conservancy, the Fire Learning Network, and the Rainwater Basin Joint Venture. A grant from the Nebraska Environmental Trust Fund has provided financial resources to allow participating landowners to rest the land from grazing in order to build up fuel that will increase the effectiveness of the burns.
