News from the Field

Arkansas: Partners have developed a <u>set of several</u> interpretive panels for the Ozark Highlands Ecosystem Restoration Project landscape. This CFLRP project encompasses a variety of habitats (including oak woodland savanna, oak-pine woodlands, pine woodlands and oak woodlands) where collaborative treatments and monitoring are being conducted. California: The Karuk Tribe DNR has won the 2020 Tribal StoryMap Challenge with the <u>presentation</u> "kúkuum yáv nukyâati peethívthaaneen" (we make the world good again). Their work with the **Western Klamath Restoration Partnership**—and on the Somes Bar Integrated Fire Management Project—is part of that story.

North Carolina: The wonderful <u>article</u> "Dying to Burn" talks about fire and forests in western North Carolina—and the work of **Adam Warwick** (<u>awarwick@tnc.org</u>). and The Nature Conservancy's **burn crew** that supports burns across the region. Adam, a landscape lead in the **Southern Blue Ridge FLN**, said "I don't know how we can burn our way out of the problem we've created, but if we want to move the needle, we need to get out there and burn."

Oregon: Burn boss **Katie Sauerbrey** (<u>katie.sauerbrey@tnc.org</u>) took viewers on a virtual day on the fireline at the **Sycan Marsh Preserve** in the Klamath Basin in a **Facebook Live** presentation a couple weeks ago. The <u>recording</u> of "Burn It Forward" is available now (skip to about the five-minute mark to miss the housekeeping details).

TREX: A recent <u>article</u> on the **National Park Service** website highlights the **Andalucia TREX** that took place last November. **Three TREX coaches—Richard Sinkovitz**, **Francisco Senra Rivero** and **Jeremy Bailey**—took part in the training, which was the **first TREX held in Spain**.

Funding: FEMA

FEMA: FEMA's new **Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities** (BRIC) program is replacing its **Pre-Disaster Mitigation** program. Resources: Public Participation / PBAs / TK & Fire / Smoke & COVID

Public Participation: The International Association for Public Participation has a nice <u>graphic</u> that shows the **spectrum of participation**, from "inform" through "empower." Good tool to help think about what you really mean—and are promising—when you "engage the public."

PBAs: California PBA has a lovely—and useful—new <u>website</u>, with information about **prescribed** burn associations in the state (and links to those on other states), a walk through the burn process, and other resources.

TK & Fire: The Northern Rockies Fire Science Network has launched a new newsletter about traditional knowledge and fire, and the first issue is chock full of great information (and lots of videos). Smoke & COVID: The American Journal of Public Health article "The COVID-19 Pandemic and Wildfire Smoke: Potentially Concomitant Disasters" briefly estimates the potential scale of the increased risk of COVID from smoke, and some advice on planning ahead to mitigate that risk.

Articles & Reports: Resilience / Tribal Perspectives / Herbaceous Groundcover / Pinyon-Juniper

Resilience: What is "resilience"? The Ecological Restoration Institute fact sheet "Managing for Resilience? Implications of Resilience in Southwestern National Forests" summarizes a Journal of Forestry article that examines how resilience is interpreted and used as an agency strategy by the U.S. Forest Service. Researchers interviewed Forest Service managers and planners revising forest plans in Region 3 and identified key considerations for using resilience as a management objective.

Tribal Perspectives: The article "How Traditional Tribal Perspectives Influence Ecosystem" Restoration" was published in the journal *Ecopsychology* last month. "Traditional perspectives can encourage more integrative, ethical, and self-reinforcing restoration that will benefit present-day tribal and non-tribal communities."

Herbaceous Groundcover: The article "Litter to Glitter: Promoting Herbaceous Groundcover and Diversity in Mid-Southern USA Oak Forests Using Canopy Disturbance and Fire" documents the effects of the combinations of thinning and season of prescribed fire on three sites over the course of nearly a decade. (One of the sites—Green River Game Lands—falls within the Southern Blue Ridge **Escarpment FLN** landscape; South Mountains FLN landscape lead **Ryan Jacobs** is a co-author.)

Pinyon-Juniper: "The Ecology, History, Ecohydrology, and Management of Pinyon and Juniper Woodlands in the Great Basin and Northern Colorado Plateau of the Western United States," a general technical report from the Rocky Mountain Research Station, is a synthesis of the current knowledge of this woodland type. (A brief overview is also available in the latest Science You Can Use issue.)
